Description:

Freedom, equality and control are core values of democracy. In the <u>Media for Democracy Monitor (MDM)</u> we translate these values into communication functions. The media's information function is derived from freedom; the forum function allowing for public discussion of diverse ideas responds to equality, and the function to act as a watchdog over the use and abuse of all types of power echoes with the control value.

These three media functions turned into MDM dimensions are then measured on 30 indicators. By way of example: company rules against external influence in the newsroom are an indicator of freedom; low ownership concentration at the national, regional and local levels is an indicator of equality; and journalism job security as an indicator of the control value/watchdog function.

In this webinar we will present the methodology of the Media for Democracy Monitor 2021, and briefly provide some of the core findings on how the leading news media and journalistic infrastructure in 18 mature democracies around the globe are performing with regard to these core values. This webinar will also mark the full release of the 2021 findings of the Media for Democracy Monitor.

Since its first edition in 2011, the MDM methodology was revised to reflect the changing conditions of the news media in a decade characterised by digital transformation, with affordances and challenges for journalists. Some new indicators were added concerning gender equality, misinformation campaigns and threat and harassment of journalists. We will illustrate our methods and findings as applied to the overall performance of leading news media in one country: the Netherlands. Furthermore, three areas of concern that are highly characteristic for journalistic practices nowadays will be discussed: the precarisation of the journalistic profession, coping with misinformation, and with growing (online) intimidation and harassment. Five researchers from the Media for Democracy Monitor team will present these topics.

The Media for Democracy Monitor 2021 (MDM) is a research project conducted under the umbrella of the Euromedia Research Group in the first half of 2020.

Josef Trappel

Josef Trappel is Professor for media policy and media economics and the head of the department for communication studies at the University of Salzburg, Austria. His research work concentrates on media and democracy, changes in media structures and their implications on mass communication, digitisation and innovation, national and international media policy and media economics.
